River Friendly Farming



Background information:

Farms are great places for wildlife to live, with lots of trees and quiet places away from towns. However, there are things on a farm which can easily damage the river if we aren't careful, like slurry, mud, chemicals or fuel from tractors. How we look after a farm can help to keep the river water clean. We call this 'River Friendly Farming'.

What you will need:

All you need for these activities is a pencil and paper. There are opportunities for extra creativity, but they are optional.

Good for the River

Clean water Clean water is very important to maintaining the health of a river and helping all those plants and wildlife that depend on it!

Fish You can find many different species of fish in UK rivers. Those common to the river include chub, barbel and minnow; but there are also those less common such as salmon, eel and shad! How many fish can you count in our picture?

Birds These are an important part of the river ecosystem and species found around UK rivers include herons, kingfishers and dippers. How many birds can you count in our picture?

People visiting the river responsibly Rivers are great places to visit for a walk or picnic, but it is important to take any litter away with you at the end of your trip.

Trees and bankside vegetation Lots of wildlife depend on trees for food and shelter, but they are also important as they help reduce flooding! If the vegetation is close to the riverbank, their roots help to stabilise the bankside by holding the soil together.

Bad for the River

Spraying crops Fertilisers and pesticides can runoff fields and enter the rivers, causing disruption to the natural ecosystems.

Throwing waste into river Even household waste can be bad for rivers because of the chemicals found in common cleaning products.

Litter Rubbish is very dangerous for wildlife in and around the river, and some plastics won't degrade for hundreds of years!

Mis-connections Some pipes in older buildings send waste from the toilet straight into the river instead of to the sewers.

Broken fence and cattle in the river Animals wear away the riverbank with their feet and they also add their own waste to the water when they go to the toilet.

Fuel leaking from car Machinery such as cars and tractors sometimes have leaks and those chemicals end up in the river. Sometimes they infiltrate (sink into) the soil and get washed into the river without being seen!
